It is never over for those who 'finish well' by Nikky Gumble Joshua 13:1, 14:6–11

Those who finish well will always have an unfinished agenda. You will be able to say. "It's not over." Again, we see this theme of the 'unfinished agenda' in the life of Joshua: "When Joshua had reached a venerable age, God said to him, 'You've had a good, long life, but there is a lot of land still to be taken'" (13:1, MSG)

Be inspired by Joshua's example. He followed the Lord wholeheartedly. So did Caleb, who was able to say, 'I however, followed the Lord my God wholeheartedly' (14:8). 'He gave himself totally to God' (v.14, MS|G).

Not only did Caleb follow God wholeheartedly at the age of forty (v.7), he still did so at the age of eighty-five (v.10) – the same age that Lesslie Newbigin was when he gave those astonishing talks. This is the challenge: to finish well, not to lose your first love but to keep your eyes on Jesus. The result for Caleb was 'strength'-Caleb was able to say, 'I'm still as strong today as the day Moses sent me out' (v.11). For him, it was physical strength as well as inward strength of character. But for all who give themselves totally to God there is the inward strength of the Holy Spirit, which Jesus promises to you and me. You need this inner strength of the Holy Spirit if you are to finish well and fulfill your calling to see the fulfilment of Jesus' new agenda.

Lord, help me to finish well. May I be able to say at the end of my life, "I have followed the Lord my God wholeheartedly". Please fill me with the inner strength of the Holy Spirit as I seek to see Jesus' new agenda fulfilled and the gospel preached in His name to all nations.

Called Home

Albert Runge November 21, 1928 – April 19, 2023
Al was born on November 21, 1928 into a Jewish family in Brooklyn, New York. In spite of poor health, poverty, and few academic skills, Al had a childlike trust in God. He accepted Jesus as his personal Savior at the age of 14, and even though his mother said he would outgrow it, he never did. He was often heard saying that the best decision he ever made was to trust Jesus with his whole life.

In the following years, AI studied at five institutions of higher learning, including Houghton College and Fuller Seminary. He pastored four churches in the U.S. and Canada, engaged in missionary work with Chosen People Ministries, did radio ministry, travelled across the world preaching and teaching and authored several books.



Al is survived by his loving wife Johanne Lee. Lee was his soulmate, best supporter and faithful companion in ministry

As Al got older, his Jewish heritage meant more and more to him, thankful that he came to faith in the Jewish Messiah. Albert's life and ministry were marked by God's faithfulness, power, and grace. He never stopped sharing the message of Jesus and how He had proven Himself faithful, preaching his last message on Good Friday, April 7, 2023.

Al once said of his life, "If it wasn't for Jesus, I would have lived a disappointed and wasted life. He nourished me with His loving kindness, His restoring power, and made my life worthwhile." A Celebration of Albert Runge's life was held on May 5 at Sevenoaks Alliance Church.

Richard Nester (1932-2023)

In the early morning of April 29, 2023, Richard Nester was suddenly recompensed by grace and entry into the eternal and glorious presence of Jesus.

After an abdominal aneurysm ruptured and emergency surgery was performed during a 4-hour operation, Richard's 90-year-old body never kicked back in. He never woke up. His last words to his three daughters as he entered the operating room were "I love you".



Scripture is so right: what a gain for our father/brother in Christ but what a deep painful loss for us. Family and friends prepared a long time for Alice's trip to heaven (May 10, 2022)... but not so for Richard's. All his things are still in the house as if he had just stepped out to do his favorite activity... going to the mailbox to collect the mail and send off his latest hand-printed letters to many friends and family.

Richard is gone... for now... till he precedes us just a little in resurrection and joins us to meet the Coming King of Kings. A long time ago, death was defeated for Richard and for all who rest in Jesus. His kingdom has come and it's not going away.



Richard Nester's life spoke and will forever shout out that truth. He touched many lives as he lived out his life verse 2 Cor 4:5 till the very last day!

"For what we proclaim is not ourselves, but Jesus Christ as Lord, with ourselves as your servants for Jesus' sake."

Richard and Alice were first missionaries to France (1966-1972) and then to Quebec (1974 to 1999) where they pastored Église du Berger (CMA) in Quebec City and the Alliance churches in Rimouski and Farnham. They then finished their official ministry by being helpful in the Noyan Alliance Church.

It was at an Alain Choiquier crusade Opération Espérance organized by Richard and the few Quebec City pastors at the time (Baptist, Brethren, Pentecostal, Alliance) that on October 25, 1974 Jean (John) Martin met Jesus and was saved. Richard was Elizabeth's father and first pastor. Richard would become Jean's first pastor and later his father-in-law.

Richard had just returned from an unforgettable, 6-month sojourn with his daughters Ruth and Debby in the USA. He was so healthy that he did not even get a simple cold.

Richard leaves in grief his 3 daughters, 5 grandchildren and 4 great-grandkids
